September in both village churches.

Then on the 11th September Bisley Parish Council chairman Cllr. Steve Moore read out the Proclamation of the Accession of King Charles III in front of Bisley Old School.

SAD News! Another Closure

Sadly, Tringham Day Centre in West End closed at the end of July 2022 after 30+ years of serving our older people. Surrey Heath Borough Council withdrew their financial support as Tringham had struggled to recover their numbers after the past two and a half years of the Covid Pandemic and lockdowns.

Our thanks to Linda Lovelock the leader at Tringhams and her deputy Ruth Cliffe for all their care, kindness and leadership. Also- many thanks to the amazing group of volunteers and drivers who made all this possible, over many years.

This brought back sad memories about the closure of 'The Butts' in Bisley a few years ago after also serving our older people for 30+years. For a while I was Chair there and continued afterwards as a volunteer in a happy, friendly place.

With winter coming, the rising heating costs of homes and other economic challenges, we should be thinking of how we as the Ward of Bisley and West End can bridge these gaps in care for older people- by providing 'warmth hubs.'

Our Community Cafe, run by our Village Hall folk over winter is a lovely example of providing a warm, welcoming, friendly place to gather for a couple of hours on Monday mornings. Chris and her team also run a cosy coffee morning in the Pavilion once a month over winter on Thursday morning. We need more, particularly at this time!

Bisley Remembers

Rev. Richard Abbott 1943-2022



We were all saddened to hear of the passing of the much-loved Richard Abbott after a courageous fight against cancer.

Doreen and I first met Richard at Christmas 1985, at Bisley Church. We had just moved to Bisley from Vienna and it was typical of Richard that he was among the first people – (along with his beloved Gill) – to warmly welcome us to the community.

I joined the Church choir and, again, Richard, with the other choir members, made me welcome. Of

course, one of our abiding memories of Richard will be of his magnificent singing voice which, like the man himself, was full of warmth and sincerity.

In his former business career, Richard was as liked and respected as he was in the church.; and in the community, everyone was delighted - but not surprised - when he was voted Bisley Citizen of the Year in 2015.

You could sometimes hear that familiar warm chuckle coming from the bar at the Hen & Chickens – and there was Richard, nursing the occasional pint. He had a dry, whimsical sense of humour. There were TV show catch-phrases that tickled Richard and he would arrive in the vestry for Sunday morning service with the greetjng "Good moaning" (from "Allo,allo"). If I made one of my ancient, corny jokes he would look at me and say "Stupid Boy" (from Dad's Army). When Richard was ordained in 2007, we all rejoiced with him, knowing that he had come to his true spiritual home; many benefitted richly from the way he conducted baptisms, family weddings and funerals.

Richard's warmth, kindness and immense strength of character – and the incalculable comfort he gave through his deeply sincere ministry - touched the lives of so many in our community and beyond. We will miss him.

We offer to Gill and the family our most heartfelt condolences.

November is the month of Remembering.

It is the month where we commemorate armistice day and remember those who gave their lives in their countries service. The British legion,

Parish council, uniformed organisations and Church are working together to ensure this is a meaningful and dignified occasion in both our communities once again this year.

It is the month of All Souls Day in the churches calendar, a time where we are reminded of those we have loved and are no longer here with us. This year the church will be hosting a special parish memorial service for any who want to remember loved ones or who are seeking a place to help process their ongoing grief.

This November I'm sure many of us in this parish will be remembering Reverend Richard Abbott who passed away last month (& whose obituary is included in this magazine).

Remembering is important.

When someone dies, a funeral gives space to look back at their life, often remembering them with fondness and gratitude for what they have done. Each of our memories of the deceased will be different, some will be clearer than others, but we look back and give thanks. At a funeral, we mark a specific, and important event in each of our lives, and especially those of the recently bereaved, the passing of a human life which was highly valued.

At a funeral we also look to the future as we commit the deceased to God, sure of a certain hope in the eternal future God has for each one of us.

Remembrance Sunday and the Parish memorial service will give the opportunity to do similar things but on a much broader canvas. To honour the lives that have shaped our history through their sacrifice and be thankful for them. To seek assurance from God that the fragility of our peace both within us and between nations can be restored through following the ways of the prince of peace, Jesus. How comforting it is, in this uncertain & troubled world to remember his words to us



ALMAC BISLEY BRASS BAND: REFLECTIONS ON A GOOD YEAR AND HOPES FOR THE FUTURE

It's been a pretty good year so far! since the last BRA Newsletter the Band has enjoyed the fun and community spirit of the Village Hall's Strawberry Fayre in June; had the pleasure of performing Brass on the Grass on the Village Green in July; entertained a sizeable

audience at the Bandstand in Woking Park on a very hot day in August and, in September, had the honour of playing the National Anthem in Woking Town Square for the Proclamation of the Accession of King Charles III.

Early autumn saw practice for and performance of our Celebration of the Last Night of the Proms on 24 September at Bisley Village Hall. A large and enthusiastic audience sang, clapped, party-poppered, flag-waved and cheered along with the traditional elements of the 'real' Proms towards the end of a performance which some said was our "best ever". Our next autumn engagement is the Remembrance Sunday service at the Memorial on the Village Green on 13th November in which it is always a privilege to participate.

Bus Shelters in Bisley.

The first known buses in Bisley were in 1924 when services were extended from the Garibaldi on the then Bisley/Knaphill boundary. In recent years we have had five bus stops in each direction along the Guildford Road.

Surrey County Council announced they were upgrading bus shelters and providing real time bus service information on small screens. Some of our bus stops already had this facility. Woking Borough Council published the information.

Suddenly, one day in the Spring, the bus shelter opposite Kingsbury Court was demolished and replaced by a new urban style black painted metal structure. This shelter is one owned by Bisley Parish Council, as are those situated at Clews Lane and Arethusa Way/Wilcot Close, who were unaware of what was to happen to their property. Enquiries revealed that a notification sent by S.C.C. to the Council had not been received, as the Council was not operational at that time. Further enquiries revealed that it was S.C.C's intention to 'upgrade' others in the Parish. Since then two new metal bus shelters have been erected at stops where none existed previously and a further one next to the B.P.C.'s Wilcot Close brick built structure.

Bisley Parish Council has asked S.C.C. to leave other existing bus shelters as they are! This is the current situation. Gerry Bixley

The Food Bank continues to serve residents of Bisley & West End who are experiencing difficulties with twice weekly deliveries of food, cleaning stuff, toiletries and pet food, as needed.



As we did in 2021 we will be organising Christmas hampers for households in

BANK need. To this end we are currently contacting local schools, charities and community groups

and asking them to let us know how many parcels they will need with details of numbers in households and any dietary requirements, etc. These details will be shared with us anonymously and the parcels will be delivered to the organisations concerned for them to organise the distribution.
